



ROBERT MCCALL BACKGROUND





HOW HE MADE HIS ART






This quote shows why McCall was driven to create his art and gives us a small glimpse at what McCall was thinking and what ideas inspired his art.



HOW MY WORK RELATES TO ROBERT MCCALL

Robert and I like details in our artworks, these three paintings outline how much detail and value we put into our works. He specifically has value and detail in his clouds and things in the foreground I have detail in the mountains and only sometimes object in the foreground





He was born on October 29th, 1942 and died on July 4, 1995. He was the host of a popular television series on PBS called The Joy of Painting. He was born in Daytona Beach Florida. When he was 18 he enlisted in the Air Force and was stationed in Alaska. In the late to early 60s he started to learn his technique from Bill Alexander who also had a PBS show about painting.

THE JOY OF PAINTING

The Joy of Painting series was on PBS and ran from 1983 - 1994. In this show Ross use the wet on wet oil technique to teach people how to paint at home. In my opinion because of Ross' tone of voice, his attitude and the way that he presents himself makes this show a relaxing and very helpful way to learn how to do the wet on wet technique. On this show he would express peace and happiness when painting and refer to different mistakes as happy accidents. Then would show how he would work with or fix these mistakes.

INSPIRATION

Bob Ross inspired me because he has the same that love for the mountains that I have. He from the mountains of Alaska while I have it from the mountains of Colorado. I started painting mountains because of how beautiful Bobs mountains looked and the way that he tells you is just relaxing so it becomes fun to paint. I used to get so stressed when I would have to do a painting because most of the time I would think it looks bad but I would submit it anyways. But thanks to Bob Ross I overcame that because my mountains were starting to look good.







Bob Ross uses the oil on oil technique, this techniques allows you to make paintings quickly because you don't need to wait for each layer to dry and you can mix paints on the canvas. Specifically for Ross, he used a layer of liquid white to coat his canvas to be able to mix paints directly on the canvas. Then Ross used either a palette knife, fan brush and 2 - 1 inch brushes to make beautiful landscapes.



WHAT WAS BOB ROSS TRYING TO SAY

Sometimes when watching Ross' show he would bring in animals that he was fostering or talk about preserving the environment because he wants to maintain nature so everyone can enjoy it. Watching his show it was easy to tell that Bob Ross was an advocate for our environment, and that he loved his time in Alaska for its natural beauty and knew it needed to be preserved and that most certainly influenced his art.









BOB ROSS QUOTE
